After the passing of my Mom two days before Christmas and her sister a mere three weeks later. I have had to re-analyze and shift my thoughts on winter. Bleak? Yes, undoubtedly. Sad, painful—beyond belief. But even looking past funerals, tears, unexpected time with family that I have not seen for some time, my Mom would tell me to look for the bright side of everything life—and death---throws your way. She was the quintessential ray of sun-

shine after a torrential downpour, always smiling, always cheerful—with a naturally beautiful singing voice to rival any professional. I can still hear her when I was a child, singing in the kitchen—full voice, lovely, unashamed. She never even gave a thought to pursuing it—dedicating her entire life to her family that brought her the greatest joys. Every act, every thought, every dream was for her children and grandchildren, and her surrounding family, no matter how scattered and far from her they may have been.

My Jubilate family has been there for me during this difficult time, and continues to be supportive with their outpouring of kind words, cards, flowers, thoughts. Now, whenever we sing, whether in rehearsal or performing, I think of my Mom, and how much she would have loved it, even though she never had a chance to see us perform, living out of state and unable to travel, due to the ravages of Parkinson's disease. The first rehearsall sang in after her passing, my voice felt stronger, deeper, fuller---as if she were right there singing with me, contributing her own loving gift to intertwine with mine (her voice is far better!!). I barely made it through the rehearsal, feeling she was indeed in that rehearsal room. I left that night, feeling better than I had in weeks. The grief comes and goes, as I assume it will forever, until I get to see her again, but music will always bring her closer to me.

So as for winter, and the cold and snow, I still love it. Now it has just taken on a new meaning for me. It has become a time of waiting, a time of renewal, a time to reflect on loved ones lost and waiting to be found again. It is a time to keep singing, no matter how bleak and unforgiving life can seem to be, for someone, somewhere always needs to hear our songs. And for that, I will never stop the music! Peace.

Perhaps the closest Jubilate came to a "bleak midwinter" experience was in the fall of 2003, the start of our second year. The first year had been a full and exciting one. We had forty-six venues under our belts, including six on a very successful concert tour of the Northwest, and we had completed our first CD in May, 2003. However, in the Fall of 2003 we lost our beloved director David Harris when he accompanied his wife to the University of Delaware to pursue her MFA degree. Even though this was to last only two years we wondered whether this would be the end of a great ride. Could we go on, and if so how?

Ultimately, David remained in place as Artistic Director and called the shots musically, although in absentia. An assistant director was chosen to conduct rehearsals and our regular slate of venues. It was a difficult adjustment as we struggled to learn new music, relearn the old music and adjust to functioning on a week to week basis. Some questioned whether or not we should even continue. To compound the issue, twelve members left the group. Still we persisted, doing the usual three or four venues a month.

David returned briefly to conduct our first ever Christmas concert at what was then First Baptist Church, and to conduct our retreat in early January. Four months later he was back for good after leading the Friends and Family concert in May 2004.

Together we not only survived the struggles of 2003, but continued to grow, transforming ourselves into the choir we are today, striving for excellence and continuing our mission of sharing music with others who need and love it.
